Q: How were you introduced to Belmont House?

We have an opportunity to not just expand the exemplary care and culture of our campus, but integrate more modern technology that will improve both care and recreation programming. I am excited for our future!

WO: I am really looking forward to being as involved as I can be with the fundraising efforts for both the new build and for our annual fundraising program. As our community grows and care needs have become more complex, the work of the Foundation is more important than ever before in our history.

CM: I want to be remembered as a Chair that provided excellent and effective support to the management at Belmont House—I am thrilled to be a part of the team that can help create positive impact in the wellbeing of all residents, tenants, and their families.

Donors Make our Home More Comfortable and Safe

Belmont House is a vibrant community. There is so much that needs to work well, and work together to thrive. Everything from the carpeting in the hallways to the furniture adorning common spaces and LTC rooms to the care equipment that keeps residents safe and comfortable is chosen with tremendous thought and care. Our home has been built to support the needs of an aging population. Often that has meant spending time and money sourcing the best possible fixtures for our home.

Mobility issues are something most of us can expect to struggle with as we get older. The risk of falling becomes greater, and getting around on foot can become slower and more painful. Our goal is to make sure residents and tenants can continue activity to the best of their ability for as long as possible.

The support of our Belmont House Foundation family of donors is what has made our home so comfortable and safe.

Belmont's hallways are designed to be wide enough for any mobility aid to navigate comfortably and we are working to install ceiling lifts in each Long-term Care room so residents can get in and out of bed with ease.

Did you know that 42% of Belmont residents and tenants use a walker, cane, or walking sticks? To ensure comfort and ease of movement, the couches, and chairs through the main hallway and in common spaces are raised higher, are firmer than normal, and have arm rests.

To further support mobility for all residents and tenants, exercise classes and on-site physiotherapy are offered. We know that strengthening our bodies is the best way to prevent harmful falls and so with the generosity of donors, we have upgraded exercise equipment in our physiotherapy room.

The support of our Belmont House Foundation family of donors is what has made our home so comfortable and safe. This year, we have planned to spend over \$200,000 on mobility-related upgrades throughout our home. Brand new ceiling lifts, therapeutic surfaces, flooring replacements, and new physiotherapy equipment are all essential for our vibrant community to continue to thrive.

An Update on our New Build Plans

T oronto is facing a housing crisis. But did you know, it's also a seniors housing crisis? Our city has lost thousands of Long-term Care beds in the past ten years while the need for care has skyrocketed. In 2022, the average wait time for a permanent Long-term Care bed in Ontario was 213 days, in Toronto it was 286 days.

Belmont House is the preferred home for many seniors in Toronto and individuals on our Long-term Care list are waiting far longer than the average time in the city.

We don't want to just be a part of the solution, we are committed to leading the fight in ensuring all seniors requiring care are able to receive it quickly, affordably, and with dignity. We have



moved forward with Architects, Montgomery Sisam and submitted plans to the government for our new building. Our vision of creating a holistic campus of care is one step closer to becoming a reality.

We are very grateful to everyone who has responded with such excitement for this project and will be inviting everyone in the Belmont community to attend a question-and-answer session with the Board of Directors and our CEO soon.
